

Michael Hardesty

Mike Hardesty has worked actively to build awareness and excitement for the organ and its music for more than 30 years. Leveraging a successful marketing and loyalty career, he has attracted new audiences to organ concerts and expanded the instrument's reach into the communities he has served as organist and choirmaster.

His methods can be unconventional: like "selling" free tickets to organ and choral concerts to ensure every seat is filled, or hosting one of America's top choral clinicians over a weekend to work with parishioners who have not identified themselves as musicians - helping them "discover" their voice and a new appreciation for music. Whether these or many other techniques he has employed, the results have been the same: increased attendance and increased admiration for the organ and vocal music.

Mr. Hardesty moved to Ohio recently, having spent most of the last 12 years in New York City, serving Grace Episcopal Church in Nutley, NJ for 10 of those years. Prior to that, he lived in the Chicago area serving as organist/choirmaster for Christ Church (Episcopal) in Waukegan, IL.

During his "free time" from 9-5 everyday, Mr. Hardesty works as a Senior Strategist for Alliance Data in the Easton area of Columbus.

He hopes to work with the Columbus chapter of the AGO to help grow attendance to organ concerts, create awareness of the instrument among our youngest musicians and look for additional ways to support area organists with strategies for building interest in the organ.

James D. Hildreth

Jim Hildreth has been Organist of Broad Street Presbyterian Church since 1987. He has been Organist with the Columbus Symphony Orchestra since 1988, and played for several seasons with the Pro Musica Chamber Orchestra. Before coming to Columbus Jim was Director of Music Ministries at First United Methodist Church in Griffin, Georgia, during which time he also sang in the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus under the late Robert Shaw. Jim has worked as an accompanist at Capital University in voice studios and for the Chapel Choir. He also taught classes on Service Playing and Improvisation at Capital and worked as a substitute organ teacher for Janet Linker. He holds a Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance from the College-Conservatory of Music of the University of Cincinnati, where he studied with Wayne Fisher and Roberta Gary, and a Master of Sacred Music in Choral Conducting from Southern Methodist University (Dallas) where he studied with Roger Deschner, Lloyd Pfautsch, Jane Marshall, and Larry Palmer. Jim serves the AGO as a reviewer of CDs and DVDs for The American Organist. He has served our Columbus Chapter in past years as a member of the Executive Committee (2 terms), Sub-Dean and Dean. He was coordinator of two chapter competitions as well as the 2007 Region V competition during our AGO Discovers Columbus convention. Jim enjoys exploring and playing the flute repertoire with his wife Valorie, a professional free-lance flutist and flute teacher. Together they form Duo Celeste.

Nancy Renneckar

Nancy Renneckar began her church music career at the age of fifteen when she became the organist at Trinity Episcopal Church in New Philadelphia, Ohio. She studied at Capital University, Kent State University, and Akron University. Nancy has a Bachelors Degree in Elementary Education with a reading certification and a minor in church music and has taught remedial reading and pre-school. She studied organ with Dr. David Britton, Dr. William Haller, Dr. John Ferguson, and Jack Russell. Having held positions in many different denominations, including Episcopal, Methodist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, and Catholic, Nancy is currently the organist for West Park United Methodist Church. She is also filling a one-year position that became vacant on the AGO Executive Committee. AGO Announces New College Scholarship Program

The American Guild of Organists is delighted to announce a new college scholarship program for organ students with financial needs:

The Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee Memorial Scholarship will be available to six students (four undergraduate, and two graduate) beginning with the 2014–2015 academic year.

- Four undergraduate scholarships in the amount \$7,500 each will be offered: one each to an incoming college freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior. Each scholarship will be renewable through completion of the student's undergraduate years of study.
- Two graduate scholarships in the amount of \$15,000 each will be offered and will be renewable for a total of two years of graduate study. Eligibility requirements and application details are available online. The application deadline is March 1, 2014.

Invitation for Co-Sponsorship Applications

The Executive Committee is accepting requests for cosponsorships for the 2014-15 program year. To qualify for consideration, an institution must demonstrate the following:

Where multiple paid organist/ director positions exist, at least two of the persons holding such positions have been members of the chapter for the year preceding the year of the proposal and are renewed members for the year of the proposal. In the case of churches, this may be one person if the positions are combined. For colleges or universities, this requirement shall be for two members of the institution's faculty.

For two previous consecutive program years and the one for which the co-sponsorship applies, the institution will have hosted or be under contract to host at least two events featuring nationally or internationally acclaimed individual artists or groups.

Please forward requests with details of the proposed program and a statement describing how your organization meets the requirements for consideration to John Schuder.

The deadline for cosponsorship requests is March 31. The Executive Committee will make co-sponsorship decisions by the end of May.

The objective of the Columbus Chapter Scholarship Program is to encourage organ students in their educational process. There is no age limit for award recipients. Candidates are eligible if they are recommended by an AGO Columbus Chapter member, who is required to submit a recommendation form. The scholarships are intended to support attendance at programs that supplement the chosen course of study. Examples include AGO Pipe Organ Encounters, AGO national or regional conventions, or similar events. The total amount of scholarship funds dispersed in any given year will be at the discretion of the Columbus Chapter Executive Board. Generally, this amount will not exceed the amount of interest received on the principal of the scholarship reserved funds. Scholarship awards will be determined by the Executive Board, or delegated to a committee. One, multiple, or no scholarships may be awarded in any given year.
