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## DEAN'S CORNER

### "A Tale of Two Names: Part the First"

"What's in a name?" If the name is *Mozart*, it might connote elegance, balance, incomparable genius, and ribald humor. Add to that his roles as husband, and father, not to mention colleague, personal friend, and brother Freemason to Franz Joseph Haydn, and an intriguing, multi-faceted individual emerges. When I was in high school, my piano teacher said something similar when he admonished me not to view Mozart or his music as "prissy" or "dainty". There is great emotional power beneath the florid surface details of Mozart's music, as the Fantasia in F-minor for organ and the great C-minor

Mass attest. His piano works have been recorded by both a supremely sympathetic artist such as Mitsuko Uchida, and an indifferent, even hostile one such as Glenn Gould: in either case, the music endures and inspires on its own merits!

J.S. Bach and Mozart are, as Jacques Barzun puts it, "among the handful who have made music convey truths"\*. Though stylistically quite different, one can view these two masters as musical "bookends" who frame eighteenth-century music. They furthermore frame and are major figures of the late seventeenth- and eighteenth-century "Enlightenment", that time of incredible cultural development that spawned (among other things) the French and American Revolutions, the U.S. Constitution, the string quartet, and Goethe's *Faust*. We still bank on the intellectual capital of that age, even as we perform and listen to this music.

I mentioned Mozart's famous F-minor Fantasia a few sentences ago. Mozart's "organ" works are one of the most intriguing portions of his musical output. Three of the works (the Fantasia, the Andante in F-Major, and the K.594 Adagio and Allegro) were originally composed for an intricate mechanical organ connected to clockwork. Any human performance of these pieces on a conventional organ (not connected to a clock, I hope!), is necessarily an "arrangement" to some extent, as the mechanical organ's pipework sounded at least one octave above notated pitch and was quite limited in timbre. The other "organ" works are the twelve "Epistle" sonatas for organ and string trio - wonderful examples of liturgical chamber music that should be in every organist's repertoire.

This fascinating music will be performed during our October 9 meeting at North Broadway United Methodist, and will serve as our chapter observance of Mozart's 250th birth anniversary. If you have not heard or performed any of this music lately, do come. Listen, savor, delight in, and be inspired once again by enduring genius!

## *Recital by Todd Wilson on Ernest M. Skinner's Opus 647*


Ernest M. Skinner's Opus 647 will be formally rededicated in a recital by renowned organist Todd Wilson on Saturday, October 7, 2006 at 4:00 PM as part of the alumni weekend celebration of Lake Erie College. Muller Pipe Organ Company of Croton, Ohio has completed the restoration of the organ, located at Lake Erie College's Morley Music Hall in Painesville, Ohio. The 64 rank, four manual organ was built in 1927, with a design influenced by Cleveland organist Edwin Arthur Kraft. The instrument had undergone significant changes over the years and nearly half of the original pipework and mechanism was lost, as was the original Skinner console. Muller's work returned the specification of the organ to the original Skinner design. Where the original was lost, replacement pipework and components from other non-extant Skinner organs were reconditioned and utilized as available. All other components and pipework are new. The new mahogany console was custom crafted by Muller and is a measured reproduction of a Skinner four manual console.
